SWCD Announces Annual Fall Tree & Shrub Sale Order by Oct. 3rd - Pick up on Oct. 12th

all is the best time to plant trees and shrubs as it allows the plants to get established and begin growing during the most ideal times for growth – the fall and spring months. The Marion County SWCD is providing high quality trees and shrubs as a fund raiser for conservation work in our county.

These trees and shrubs are container stock with exceptional root systems to give them a great start. They are easy to plant and most are native to Indiana. Native plants have the advantage of being well suited to our soil types and climate. They are also the most beneficial plants for wildlife and they are not invasive.

Newly planted trees need extra TLC – be sure to provide an inch of water for them every week if we don't have adequate precipitation. Check our website for more tips on caring for new trees the first year.

Contact the SWCD or our website for a description of the trees available. The descriptions include whether the tree is best suited to full sun or partial shade, the type of soil it grows best in and the size the plant will be at maturity.

Orders can be picked up on Saturday, October 12th between noon and 2:00 p.m. at the Indiana State Fairgrounds.

Tackling Green Invaders *First Phase of Conservation Projects*

≺ackling green invaders - Millersville at Fall Creek Valley Inc., the Town of Fortville and Fortville Action Inc. are progressing with projects to remove invasive plants and reestablish native vegetation along a retention pond and Stottlemyer Ditch, respectively. This fall, the Indianapolis Sailing Club will launch a similar project along its portion of Geist Reservoir's shoreline. The Upper White River Watershed Alliance awarded cost-share grants to these organizations, and the Fall Creek Watershed Partnership (FCWP) Backyard Conservation Program, West Central Indiana Cooperative Weed Management Area (WCICWMA), and Indy Parks and Greenways are providing technical assistance to train community volunteers on plant identification, removal, and naturalization of these waterscapes with native grasses, wildflowers, shrubs and trees. Native flora help reduce erosion and sedimentation with their deep root structures and filter out pollutants from storm water runoff, thereby enhancing water quality as well as providing valuable wildlife habitat.

Millersville's retention pond at 56th Street and Fall Creek was infested with Asian bush honeysuckle and Canada thistle, among other unwanted plants and debris. Along with the conservation work, plans include making this riparian area a user-friendly pocket park with picnic tables and benches. Fortville's Stottlemeyer waterscape is a central feature in town flowing by residences and between Landmark and Memorial Parks. Its banks show the signs of increasingly aggressive invasives such as Asian bush honeysuckle and Reed canarygrass. These invasives, among others, are exotic species that are ecological pioneers and colonizers. Once introduced these undesirables can quickly establish themselves and crowd out native vegetation. Additionally, they can negatively impact indigenous wildlife



because their fruit and seeds provide little to no food value.

With ever increasing numbers of invasives on land and in the water (a topic to dive into later), removal and maintenance projects like these are an essential first step to re-establishing native Indiana plants and healthy ecosystems.

Right Tree - Right Location

- Plant only dwarf trees and shrubs under utility lines.
- ♦ Think long term plan for the mature height and width of the tree when planting
- Leave plenty of space between trees for future growth and sunlight needs
- Don't plant trees close to building foundations
- ◆ Don't plant trees over septic fields or old sanitary sewer lines
- Plant trees to shade your home and outdoor living spaces during the hot summer months.
 You will be more comfortable and will save electricity
- Plant evergreen trees along the north and west sides to help block cold winter winds
- ♦ Plant berry producers and evergreens in view of windows to enjoy birdwatching throughout the year.

Where to Plant

here do I plant this thing? Just like real estate, the most important thing about planting a tree is <u>location</u>, <u>location</u>, <u>location</u>! Fall is the best time to plant trees and shrubs – but plan for the long term before digging that first hole. First off, be sure to have all underground utilities marked before you dig. Call 811 at least 2 days ahead to have utilities marked for you. Then choose your trees based on what you are looking for – shade, windbreak, wildlife food or shelter, aesthetics – and based on what the tree needs.

Trees do best in environments that meet their requirements for soil type, sunlight and space. Some species are well suited to urban settings and others are not. Be sure to plan with the mature tree height and width in mind. See the column on the left for specific limitations to keep in mind.
